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## **AUDIT RESULTS**

#### Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Pool operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Washington Schools Risk Management Pool from September 1, 2019 through August 31, 2020.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Pool's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2020, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Compliance with risk pool solvency requirements
- Accounts payable credit cards
- Citizen referral procurement

## INFORMATION ABOUT THE POOL

The Washington Schools Risk Management Pool was formed on August 31, 1986, pursuant to Chapter 48.62 of the Revised Code of Washington. The Pool's purpose is to provide its members the capability and authority to jointly purchase property/liability insurance, establish, and maintain a reserve to pay for self-insurance coverage, provide a plan of self-insurance, and provide related services, including a cooperative program of risk management. The membership of the Pool consists of approximately 79 school districts, including 6 educational service districts and 5 interlocal cooperatives with a total insured value of approximately \$23 billion.

The Pool is governed by a 10-member Board of Directors, as well as seven ex-officios who are appointed and non-voting. Board Members are elected from the member districts to serve staggered, three-year terms. The Board appoints an Executive Director to oversee the Pool's daily operations. The Pool employs no staff but instead contracts with Puget Sound Educational Service District No. 121 for administrative support. Approved 2019-2020 operating budget of \$59,429,664 for Revenues, and \$53,936,389 for Expenses.
